#### Introduction

#### General Information

Development of human potential through tertiary education is an important contribution of the *Evangelischer Entwicklungsdienst* (EED - Church Development Service) to development that complements other forms of development co-operation aiming more directly at poverty alleviation.

The scholarship programme of EED serves the strengthening of ecumenical awareness and ecumenical co-operation. It provides a forum where people of different denominational, cultural, national, religious and ideological background can meet.

The scholarship gives students the chance to enhance their knowledge and professional skills through higher studies and to gain a higher academic degree. The scholarship programme of EED neither sponsors individual careers nor the brain drain. Through purposeful further academic education it rather contributes to personnel development of institutions.

Scholars are not only learners. Apart from their academic and professional qualification they carry experiences and knowledge which they can share. Especially the presence of ecumenical scholars as our guests in Germany provides a chance for ecumenical sharing and mutual learning in congregations, churches and universities. Living together with our guests we can experience the worldwide church and we can realize what our duty as Christians is in this world. In dialogue we can come to an understanding about the meaning of 'development' globally as well as locally.

# The Ecumenical Scholarship Programme and the EED Scholarship Programme

The scholarship desk of EED in co-operation with the scholarship desk of the *Diakonisches Werk der EKD* in Stuttgart (Diaconal Services of the EKD) operates the *Ecumenical Scholarship Programme* as a joint programme.

#### Mandate

The scholarship programme of EED supports National Christian Councils, churches, development-oriented NGOs and Christian universities and colleges in developing countries in the up-grading and advanced training of their personnel. EED grants scholarships for development-oriented studies in Germany, other European countries and in developing countries to graduates with professional experience from developing countries. Advanced studies in theology are sponsored only in a few exceptional and special cases. Furthermore, EED grants scholarships to *free movers* from developing countries in Germany, i.e. to students who came without scholarship and are not part of an academic mobility programme.

The scholarship desk of the EED has the mandate

- to provide scholarships to graduates with professional experience from developing countries for developmentoriented studies in Germany and other European countries
- to provide scholarships to lecturers of church related universities from developing countries for studies in Germany, other European countries and in developing countries (academic partnership programme)
- to provide scholarships to free movers from developing countries in Germany
- to provide guidance and to further the integration and orientation of the scholars during their studies
- to provide counselling during the period of studies and opportunities for intercultural learning as well as co-curricular seminars on development policy and ethics of science
- to prepare scholarship holders for their return home and to promote their reintegration by establishing and nurturing continuous contact.

## Programme components

The scholarship programme of EED consists of three components:

♦ Academic Partnership Programme: This programme supports church-related universities and colleges in building up and upgrading their faculties. The objective is to strengthen the

independence of academic institutions from non-national staff. Scholarships for higher studies - especially for doctoral studies - are granted for studies in Germany, other European countries and developing countries. Candidates must be nominated by appropriate organizations in developing countries.

- Programme for Churches and NGOs: This programme is intended to help churches and church-related development organizations as well as NGOs in the development of their staff and to help to enable them to meet their requirements for highly qualified specialists. Scholarships are granted for higher studies in Germany and other European countries. Candidates must be nominated by appropriate organizations in developing countries.
- ♦ Programme for Free Movers from Developing Countries in Germany: This programme supports free movers from developing countries in Germany who are interested in development policy, committed to social involvement, focus their studies on development, have a realistic option to return home and have been nominated by Protestant students' congregations (ESG) or regional co-curricular programmes (STUBEn) (for more information see the Programminformation für frei eingereiste Studierende aus Entwicklungsländern; available only in German).

The scholarship programme is meant for students from developing countries according to the available list provided by DAC of OECD (see <a href="http://www.oecd.org/dataoecd/43/51/35832713.pdf">http://www.oecd.org/dataoecd/43/51/35832713.pdf</a>).

Candidates who besides the nationality of their home country posses the nationality of an industrialized country are not eligible for a scholarship, since the funds of EED are earmarked for nationals of developing countries.

## Scope of the Scholarship Programme

The scholarship programme of the EED is financed through church taxes (KED) and funds from the German Federal Ministry for Economic Co-operation and Development (BMZ). With these funds up to approximately 100 scholarships in Germany, other European countries and in developing countries can be financed. Depending on the available funds about 20 new candidates can be accepted per year.

#### **Procedure for Application**

The EED normally considers candidates only if applications reach us through a Church, a National Christian Council, a NGO, a church-related university or other church-related or para-state organisations which apply on behalf of their co-workers within the frame of their personnel development plan. Applications on behalf of free movers in Germany must reach us through the Evangelische Studentengemeinde (ESG) or a regional co-curricular programme (STUBE).

Application forms must be obtained from and returned to the EED scholarship desk. The application form for applications within the frame of the academic partnership programme and the programme for Churches and NGOs must be accompanied by the following documents:

- Curriculum Vitae
- authenticated copies of the secondary school leaving certificate
- authenticated copies of university certificates and transcripts. If the certificates are not in German, English or French an officially authenticated translation must be included. You are advised to contact the nearest embassy or consulate of the Federal Republic of Germany on this matter. The EED needs these documents to help candidates, if necessary, to find a supervisor and a place for the candidate's course of studies
- authenticated copies of language course certificates
- letter/s of recommendation addressing the candidate's personal qualities
- letter/s of recommendation regarding the candidate's professional and academic qualification
- research proposal in the case of doctoral studies; in other cases a description of the course of studies
- doctoral candidates must send along their master thesis
- statement concerning the relevance of the study project for the home country

- a brief representation of the nomination organization and its work with special reference to the aspect of gender; in case an organization nominates a candidate for the first time we require more basic information of the organization (name; founding year; aims and objectives; focus of activities; composition of governing board; members; net-working with other organizations)
- guarantee of subsequent employment by the nominating organization and statement concerning the relevance of the study project for the nominating organization
- health certificate.

Please note that only applications with complete documents can be processed. The application form must be stamped and signed by a representative of the nominating organization on the front page.

We expect that candidates have a clear idea of what they intend to achieve through their studies and that they have already contacted appropriate universities. Candidates should take initiative to acquire information about the conditions for admission and the study conditions.

#### Criteria for Selection

- the academic qualification of the candidate
- the commitment of the candidate to her/his church and to development work
- the candidate must at least hold a first academic degree and have a minimum of two to five years of professional experience
- the candidate must have been selected and nominated by an organization within the frame of their personnel development plan; this organization must guarantee employment after her/his return
- candidates nominated by church-related partners in Germany (e.g. ESG, STUBE) should be known to them for a longer period of time and should have shown interest in voluntary work (applies only for free movers)

- the candidate should have been nominated for higher studies in view of a specific purpose for her/his future assignment in the organization
- studies should be development oriented and focus on issues which are dealt with in the conciliar process (justice, peace, integrity of creation)
- we prefer younger candidates (definitely not above 40 years, for doctoral studies 35 years)
- we are committed to increase the number of women among our scholarship holders and give thus priority to women
- we prefer candidates who pursue their studies in Germany; however the possibility of studies in other European countries and under certain circumstances also in developing countries is open.

#### Nomination Organization

In the selection of candidates it is also taken into account whether the nominating organization

- is a church related organization, part of civil society or a church-related university
- is development oriented and involved in processes aiming at liberation from hunger, poverty, disease and unjust power structures
- is open for ecumenical and/or intercultural dialogue
- has a personnel development plan
- is able to use the expertise of the candidate after her/his return adequately.

## Handling of Applications

The EED staff checks the applications, the documents and information on the basis of the above mentioned criteria and prepares a presentation for decision in the *Ecumenical Scholarship Committee*.

During the meetings of the *Ecumenical Scholarship Committee* the staff of the EED acts as "defender" of the applicant, i.e. the better the information provided in an application is, the better an application can be defended.

#### **Deadlines**

The final decision about the applications lies with the *Ecumenical Scholarship Committee* which meets twice a year in *May* and *November*. Please note that we need to receive the application well in advance before the meeting. The *deadline* for the meeting in *May* is 1 *January*; the deadline for *November* is 1 *July*.

#### Criteria for the Furtherance of Doctoral Studies

#### Introduction:

The *Ecumenical Scholarship Committee* agreed upon the following principles and criteria. These criteria are intended to serve as guidelines for the nomination and selection of doctoral candidates for our ecumenical partners as well as for the scholarship committee itself.

## Principles and Objectives:

With regard to grants for doctoral studies the various, partly contradictory interests, objectives, motivations, needs and contexts of individuals and institutions involved in the furtherance of doctoral studies must be adequately considered.

The EED supports doctoral studies with the *objective*,

- to promote under the aspect of development the scholarly reflection and study of issues and problems which can be summarised under the keywords of the conciliar process for justice, peace and integrity of creation
- to strengthen and to intensify intercultural and interreligious exchange as well as co-operation between churches and academic institutions
- to support ecclesiastical partners, predominantly Christian universities and colleges as well as NGOs in developing countries in their efforts to further qualify and train their personnel academically

- to build up and to strengthen academic capacity in developing countries especially for teaching
- to promote the personal development of scholarship holders and to enhance their knowledge and academic ability.

#### Criteria:

#### Institutional Criteria:

- The partners must prove that the scholarship applied for is in recognisable agreement with the work and objectives of the respective institution and they must also determine for what purpose doctoral qualification of the nominated candidate is required for their institution (i.g. university, research institute, church institution, development programme of the church).
- The application must be in recognisable agreement with the personnel planning of the nominating institution; ecumenical partner institutions will be given preference.
- The partners must guarantee that on return the candidate will be employed in the nominating institution and that his/her
- position allows him/her to make creative use of the acquired knowledge as well as to constantly increase it
- It is expected that the partners keep open the possibility for returned candidates to continue the process of their personal development and intercultural learning within the frame of the given position.

#### Candidate/Personal Criteria:

- Good references for the candidate must be available which show that
  - she/he is engaged in social and developmental activities
  - she/he is able to cope with the demands and burdens of studies abroad

- on return she/he is willing to integrate into the work team of the nominating institution.
- In case the candidates are awarded a scholarship they are obligated to make available the acquired knowledge after their return on all levels of the educational system and to make use of their knowledge wherever it is necessary for the development of their home country.
- During doctoral studies the candidates must be ready for a regular check of their work and time-schedule.
- Candidates must show a clearly recognisable motivation for their studies.
- The age-limit for doctoral candidates is 35 years; exceptions require a special reason.
- It must be clarified whether and how doctoral studies and obligations to the family are compatible.
- Follow-up scholarships [i.e. scholarships for candidates who already have received a scholarship] may include furtherance of doctoral studies, which may be necessary in cases where scholarships promised by the government of the candidate's home country have been cancelled or where because of repression, loss of employment or persecution in times of political crisis a return to the home country seems to be advisable only at a much later time.

## Candidate/Academic Criteria:

- Candidates must have the necessary academic qualification for doctoral studies and they must show an academic performance above standard.
- Candidates who plan to undertake doctoral studies in Germany are required to present a clear thesis proposal, which documents that the candidate already has acquired a basic knowledge of her/his field of specialised research, that she/he is familiar with the basic literature in the field of specialisation and that she/he is able to integrate her/his research into the present state of research. With regard to doctoral studies in France and Great Britain this

criterion ought to be modified according to the respective academic traditions (e.g. in France a thesis proposal will be worked out only during the obligatory DEA course). The decision concerning the place for doctoral studies (in Germany, in other European countries, in developing countries) depends on factors like e.g. courses offered, recognition of previous degrees, language requirements etc. and should be taken with consideration to the individual case.

- Good academic references for the candidate must be available as well as the promise of a professor to accept her/him as doctoral candidate.
- The candidate must produce the official admission to doctoral studies by an university or department of an university.
- Follow-up scholarships [i.e. scholarships for candidates who already have received a scholarship] may include furtherance of doctoral studies in cases where the first course of studies has been completed with above average results within the originally projected time and if the partners overseas agree.

#### Criteria as to the Content:

- Objectives and contents of doctoral studies ought to be relevant for development and related to the context of the candidate's home country; the topic of the dissertation should be selected in view of the objectives of the nominating partner institution.
- The statement of the problem of a study project ought to be compatible to the issues of the conciliar process and should include the religious, cultural and social dimension of development.
- The dissertation should contribute to the analysis or solution of problems of development as well as to the formation of a new identity for research and teaching through the integration of knowledge and values from different cultures.

#### General Criteria:

- Women and men must be considered equally with regard to scholarship awards. In cases of equal qualification women are given preference.
- The academic graduation must be in accordance with the requirements of the labour market in the candidate's home country.
- Doctoral studies in Germany should be sponsored if
  - the study project can be completed successfully within a reasonable period of time in a German university
  - German universities are interested in a long term co-operation with institutions of higher learning in developing countries
  - the scholarship can contribute to enable returning candidates to build up or intensify links between universities or research institutions in their home country and German universities and institutions.
- The Ecumenical Scholarship Programme in Stuttgart (ESP) supports doctoral studies only in exceptional cases if they are especially needed by partner organisations for their qualification requirements. Only such study projects can be sponsored which can be undertaken in Asia, Africa or Latin America.

## Grants

The EED supports the scholars materially and spiritually. In addition to the scholarship the programme offers advice to the candidates in personal and academic matters. The co-curricular programme offers seminars and excursions and provides a forum where scholars can meet and interact.

The EED scholarship includes travel to the country of studies and back home and covers living expenses, tuition fees and in European countries also health insurance. The scholarship is paid monthly according to the applicable scholarship rules. The current family policy of the programme is to grant scholarship holders who are staying for more than 18 months the option of bringing their families with them. An extra allowance for spouses and children will be paid in such cases. In cases where the family does not accompany the scholarship holder, EED is prepared to finance travel costs for a visit once a year either for the scholarship holder or for the spouse in order to enable them to meet either at home or in the place of study. It must be indicated in the application form whether a candidate wants to come with his/her family. This will be binding in case a scholarship is awarded. It also should be noted that the scholarship will consider the civil status indicated in the application. It will not be possible for EED to assume financial responsibilities for any change in the civil status presented afterwards.

Candidates should be aware that certain problems might occur when their family accompanies them to the place of study. The most serious problem is accommodation. It is difficult e.g. to find accommodation at a reasonable price in Germany or other European countries. Families therefore might have to live in relatively small flats. Another problem is the question of adjustment of the family, especially of the children. Children above the age of six have to attend school, and this might mean e.g. that those coming to Germany experience several changes of schools within a relatively short period. Our experience has shown that the problems of adjustment are considerably less serious for children who have not yet reached puberty.

Accepting a scholarship in a foreign country is not only a privilege, it also requires a considerable sacrifice on the part of the scholarship holders and their families. *The personal situation and the situation of the family therefore should be seriously considered before applying for a scholarship*. The nominating organization bears high responsibility for co-workers whom they send abroad for studies.

#### Health

We strongly recommend taking the medical check-up in relation to the required health certificate seriously. Knowledge of one's own health status can help to avoid sudden and dramatic breakdowns of health at a later stage because it allows for early therapeutic measures. This is vitally important not only with regard to HIV/AIDS, but also regarding other serious diseases.

## Studying in Germany

Candidates intending to study in Germany are advised to make themselves familiar with *German universities and academic studies in Germany.* Please visit the website of the *Deutscher Akademischer Austauschdienst* (DAAD): <a href="www.daad.de">www.daad.de</a>.

#### German as Lingua Franca

Lingua franca in Germany is German. Although more and more university courses are offered in English the language of instruction at German Universities generally is German. A good knowledge of German is therefore absolutely imperative for anyone studying in Germany. Except for courses offered in English German universities generally require the Deutsche Sprachprüfung für den Hochschulzugang ausländischer Studienbewerber (DSH; formerly: Prüfung zum Nachweis deutscher Sprachkenntnisse, PNdS), a language proficiency test, prior to admission.

In preparation for the DSH the *Studienkolleg* of the *Ökumenisches Studienwerk* (ÖSW) in Bochum - a subsidiary of the EED - offers intensive language courses for all scholarship holders. For those who have no knowledge of German it will take almost one year of hard work until they are able to pass the proficiency test in German. Most of the EED scholarship holders, except those who take courses taught in English, will have to study German up to the level of the DSH. Those who take courses taught in English nevertheless will have to acquire a basic knowledge of German.

The *language course at the Studienkolleg of the ÖSW in Bochum* is divided into four terms of 10 weeks each with a total of at least 250 hours of teaching: January - March; April - June; July - September; October - December. Courses are offered on four levels:

- Grundstufe 1 (G1): This course is for absolute beginners and for candidates with a rudimentary knowledge of German and covers basic German grammar and conversation in everyday situations.
- Grundstufe 2 (G2): This course is the continuation of Grundstufe 1 and deals with more advanced grammar, conversation, discussion techniques and composition. The course aims at participants with a sound basic knowledge of German.

- Mittelstufe (MS): This course is meant for advanced learners and leads to the certificate Abschluss Mittelstufe (Intermediate Level Certificate). This course enables participants to read and write technical and fictional texts of average standard in German.
- Oberstufe (OS): This course prepares candidates for the DSH in which they are required to demonstrate both a written and an oral command of German on proficiency level.

We urgently advise candidates who intend to study in Germany to make use of the opportunities available for learning German in their home countries (German departments at universities, Goethe http://www.dw-Institut: www.goethe.de. Deutsche Welle world.de/dw/0,2068,00.html). In quite a number of countries it is possible to learn German up to proficiency level. If possible, applicants should at least have a basic knowledge of German (equivalent to Grundstufe 1) and they should have passed a test in Grundstufe 1 (basic level German). As experience shows, this certainly saves time and money and protects candidates from the almost unavoidable disappointments which will arise through the unfamiliarity and even harshness of the new surroundings.

Nowadays English is the international language of science and research. Therefore a good knowledge of English is mandatory for students no matter in which country they pursue their studies and what the language of instruction may be. We recommend that all candidates cultivate their knowledge of English respectively learn English prior to their studies abroad.

## Where to study?

To a certain extent the EED scholarship programme also supports candidates who intend to go to other European countries or who want to pursue their studies in their home region in Asia, Africa or Latin America. EED does not sponsor studies in the U.S., Canada or Australia. In these cases we recommend to apply with foundations in these countries. However, *because of reasons of mandate studies in developing countries can be supported only within the academic partnership programme* (see above). Candidates who do not qualify for the academic partnership programme should address the *scholarship desk of the Diaconal Service* in Stuttgart:

About 51% of all former scholars studied in Germany, 25% in other European countries and 24% in developing countries. The place of studies depends on factors like the availability of suitable courses, the acknowledgement of previous academic degrees, the time needed to learn new languages, costs, the interest of the sending institution and of the candidate. Decisions about the place of study should be made on a pragmatic basis.

## Continuous Contacts / Nachkontakte

The scholarship programme of the EED is in the position to support participation of former EED scholarship holders and ÖSW scholarship holders in conferences, summer universities, refresher courses or other professional programmes. There is a limited budget available for this purpose. Grants will be given according to the following criteria and are subject to the availability of funds:

- Eligible are only former ÖSW/EED scholars. They can apply two years after successful completion of their course of studies at the earliest.
- Applicants must live in their home country or in another developing country.
- Only participation in programmes (such as conferences, study tours and summer universities) of not more than 60 days duration will be sponsored; the programmes must be related to the present occupation of the applicant and they must be suited to strengthen the professional competence of the applicant.
- Upon application, EED can award a grant. This grant is paid as a lump sum and amounts to 1.000,00 € for air travel and 70,00 € per day for board and lodging during the first 10 days and 26,00 € per day for board and lodging from the 11<sup>th</sup> to the 60<sup>th</sup> day.
- In case a grant is given the initial payment will be 75% of the total, the remaining 25% will be transferred on receipt of the report.
- Applications for the current year will be considered according to the date of receipt on a first-come-first-served-basis.
- Applications must contain a detailed programme and a detailed statement regarding the cost and the financing of the costs; convincing reason must be given why the participation in the programme is important.
- Participation in the programme must be approved by the candidate's employer.
- The applicant is obliged to submit a report about the event on completion.

- The EED scholarship desk in Bonn will decide upon applications; the Ecumenical Scholarship Committee will be informed about the decision by the report given within the committee's meeting.
- Please note that we do not award a grant for *Nachkontakte* to the same person in subsequent years.
